## WORK BOXES & FIRST AID CAGES

Although they appear similar, there are a few key differences which could be the difference between life & death.

## **WORK BOXES SHOULD;**

- Be used only to perform work where other methods are unsafe or impracticable
- Be supplied with harnesses and anchorage points
- Only accommodate a maximum of three people
- Have self-closing and selflocking inward opening doors
- Have sides at least 1m high, compliant with AS 1657 and have an internal hand rail at the top edge



## **FIRST AID CAGES MUST;**

- Only be used for rescue or retrieval of injured persons
- Display first aid signage
- Be kept clean and hygienic, not used to store materials
- Be within reach of the crane and easily accessible
- Have fully enclosed sides and be suitable to transport injured persons
- Have self-closing and selflocking outward opening doors

A risk assessment must be completed by a competent person before anyone is suspended by a crane, and workers need to be trained in implementing any emergency procedures, which also must be tested. Additionally boxes are to be marked with; the maximum hoisted load, the safe working load, the tare mass, minimum allowable crane capacity, and an identification reference. In order to be able to lift people, the crane must have a secondary brake. Further, lifting of persons should not be conducted in winds in excess of 7m/s (25.2km/h) as per Australian Standards.
